"It's really exciting. I was just talking to the school nurse earlier and she said that normally, to do a vision screening for a child, it takes an average of 10 minutes. This will take probably 10 seconds," he said.

On Thursday, Spot was making its local debut as vision screenings were offered for every student from

the pre-kindergarten class through fifth grade.

Because the device uses a scanner, the screenings are not dependent on the subjective opinions of the patient. Children especially may have a hard time interpreting their vision for a medical professional.

"All they have to do (for a Spot screening) is look and smile. ... It's really a neat device and it's so helpful especially when you get it to kids this age," Somple said.

C.K. Chorley, a sales representative who conducted most of the screenings, said several Spot devices were already in use for children across the country although it can be used by people of all ages.

"The reason we focus on children a lot is because there's a lot of kids that haven't had care. Twenty-five percent of children in schools have vision issues and of those 25 percent only 10 percent of those actually have glasses so it's a huge problem and it needs to be addressed," he said.

PediaVision's literature cites a 2010 study that found healthy children were better learners.

The results of scans conducted at a school would typically be given to the school nurse who would then get it to parents, according to Chorley. The scan provides information that parents could present to an optometrist or ophthalmologist for follow-up care.

Somple said another benefit to Thursday's screening was that it gave people in the community an insight into some of the work being done at Mack.

"Sometimes we forget that people don't really know what we do in that big building up on the hill there and this is a way of opening up and opening the doors a bit and saying, 'This is the type of product we do.' It's exciting. It's high-tech work (and) it's medical work," he said.
